Tourism-Copenhagen

38 students filled out the survey corresponding to 61%. All of these were 7th semester students.

67% state they spend 40+ hours or between 30-40 hours. 7% between 20-30 hours, and 26% between 10-20 hours. The general tendency is good but it is concern for the Study Board that 26% only spend between 10-20 hours. In comparison to this the self-perception of work efforts has 84% answer that their work-load is satisfactory.

The respondent are divided between feeling well-informed about coherence between study activities in the semester. Only 41% agrees or completely agrees to this, while 21% disagrees or 13% completely disagrees. The Study Board will follow up on this. The assessment of the academic benefit is also a concern. 54% find it to be average, 29% big and 8% very big.

The respondents declare the most important competences obtained to be the ability to analyze and discuss particular problematics, critical thinking and understanding the complexities of the tourism industry.

The number of respondents decline when we look at the second part of the survey and 20-25 students have answered to these questions.

95% of the respondents took part in group work while writing projects. 60% states that the group work went well. 25% disagrees or completely disagrees. 25% answers that the team work went well and 17% completely agrees. 25% states that the team work did not go well. The qualitative responses tell that individual chemistry between group members and different study cultures are the main problems. Again it should be noted that 25% corresponds to five students.

54% of the respondents feel well-informed about practical issues.

The physical conditions is again assessed very positive.

The evaluation of the study community is positive (74% satisfactory). A majority also agrees or completely agrees (70%) to thriving at their education.
